Yahoo/Aol IMAP Pagination and Mail Sync

Introduction

There have been several extensions on IMAP to support multiple clients operating efficiently on a mailbox and reduce the client-server payload. However, clients are still sending requests to servers that are increasingly expensive as the mailbox keeps increasing in size.

IMAP servers use two different ids to uniquely identify messages in a mailbox. UID, unique identifiers persist across sessions while message sequence numbers are assigned based on the message's relative position in a mailbox. In order to compute these message sequence numbers and associations to messages in the mailbox, the server and client create a snapshot of the mailbox in memory. Both client and server will operate on the in-memory mailbox model during a connected session. Computation of message sequence numbers is quite onerous on servers for users with large mailboxes as servers need to cache the entire message list. In most cases, users rarely access their older messages but due to the IMAP protocol design & implementation, clients are continuously seeking updates on all the messages. IMAP CONDSTORE was created to reduce the payload retrieved from the servers. However, CONDSTORE works only for existing messages and clients perform a full mailbox synchronization to identify the deleted messages. CONDSTORE needs to return sequence numbers on updates to existing messages that require the server to compute the message's relative position.

In this document, we are proposing a few changes that will let clients walk through a user's entire mailbox while allowing servers to operate more efficiently. We also demonstrate a message-limiting change to mailboxes with messages more than a pre-configured limit at the end.

Staging Endpoints for Yahoo/Aol IMAP

IMAP Protocol Changes

IMAP clients currently use the message sequence numbers to walk through a mailbox when working with a defined set of messages or sometimes to reduce payload from the server. To replace this request, we will be using <u>IMAP PARTIAL RFC</u> that will allow clients to walk through

the entire mailbox using only UIDs. The following section uses the IMAP PARTIAL capability for clients to determine the maximum number of messages that can be retrieved per imap command. We also provide examples using IMAP PARTIAL syntax for adding pagination arguments to imap commands. We explain the change in IMAP server responses due to the introduction of the new IMAP PARTIAL capability.

Message Limits

The IMAP server will expose the maximum number of messages in a response as the capability, MESSAGELIMIT. IMAP server advertises PARTIAL and MESSAGELIMIT in its CAPABILITY list as shown below:

An IMAP client should send the "CAPABILITY" command **post authentication** to retrieve the message limit, MESSAGELIMIT, for that session. IMAP clients should keep all IMAP commands to return messages below the server's announced limit. IMAP clients requesting more than the limit on any IMAP message commands will receive only partial message responses. The IMAP response changes to a failure with partial message responses in UidOnly mode or when the client uses the pagination arguments as described in those sections.

Examples below demonstrate the IMAP server responses to requests that exceed the posted message page limit.

Sample selected mailbox for the operations below:

Pagination Changes

IMAP clients can walk efficiently through a mailbox only through the use of message sequence numbers as they do not have gaps. Maintaining message sequence numbers on the server and client is quite expensive as server & client need to load the entire mailbox into memory. While some IMAP clients make all their requests for message discovery and updates using UIDs and avoiding the use of message sequence numbers completely, the IMAP server still has to compute MSNs for all message responses. Without message sequence numbers, message synchronization or discovery that requires a client to walk through the entire mailbox will be quite expensive for a client as UIDs are sparse.

Using pagination, an IMAP client can start from any valid UID and request a page of UIDs going all the way to the latest message; UIDNEXT - 1, or to the earliest message; 1. An IMAP client can use the pagination changes on all servers that publish the PARTIAL capability. Pagination support is only added on FETCH & SEARCH commands that are used for message discovery. COPY, MOVE, STORE & EXPUNGE are expected to operate on previously downloaded messages known to the IMAP clients and the client is expected to paginate using a sequence of individual UIDs.

FETCH Command Pagination

An IMAP client can make a FETCH request with pagination by passing a single UID range and a message count that is less than or equal to the announced PARTIAL capability. IMAP requests with multiple ranges or lists of uids will be rejected. Message sequence number requests with pagination will also be rejected. The following pagination examples illustrate the request and responses on any selected mailbox:

1. Fetch UID & Flags for 10 oldest in the 25900 to 26600 range in batches of 5

SEARCH Command Pagination

Similar to FETCH, the SEARCH request with pagination will work with a single UID range. SEARCH command pagination requests and responses are described below:

"All Mail" Mailbox

"All Mail" mailbox represents a virtual IMAP mailbox that provides access to all the user's mailboxes using a unified view as described in <u>RFC 6154</u>. An IMAP client can interact with this virtual mailbox similar to other IMAP mailboxes.

All interactions between server and client must follow the standard IMAP protocol specification unless documented here. Support for <u>IMAP ENABLE RFC</u> is a prerequisite for supporting the "All Mail" mailbox.

Once enabled, IMAP clients can use LIST, STATUS, SELECT, EXAMINE commands to access the "All Mail" mailbox.

On the LIST response, the "All Mail" mailbox is identified using the <u>LIST special use</u> mailbox attribute, "\All". The CREATE or RENAME or DELETE of the "All Mail" mailbox will fail as the name is reserved and there is no real mailbox to delete.

The "All Mail" mailbox includes "Trash" and "Spam" messages.

As UIDs by definition have gaps, the IMAP server has pagination **PARTIAL** support on FETCH and SEARCH for clients to walk through a mailbox.

The following changes apply to all imap responses in the "All Mail" mailbox:

- The IMAP server will enable **QRESYNC** along with "All Mail". <u>CONDSTORE</u>, <u>OBJECTID</u>, PARTIAL are available for all mailboxes.
- The IMAP server will switch to the <u>UIDONLY RFC</u> after "All Mail" is enabled on all mailboxes. All message queries and updates should be performed using UIDs.
- The IMAP server will include MAILBOXID(s), from <u>OBJECTID RFC</u>, in every message FETCH response to identify the mailboxes a message belongs to without an explicit client request for the MAILBOXID.
- The UID MOVE command executed in the "All Mail" mailbox will update the message's MAILBOXID. The UID MOVE will return an untagged FETCH response with the updated MAILBOXID.
- The UID STORE command can also be used to update a message's MAILBOXID. Similar to UID MOVE, the UID STORE will return an untagged FETCH response with the updated MAILBOXID.

Due to server implementation limitations, **QRESYNC** on non "All Mail" mailboxes will not return deleted messages for CHANGEDSINCE queries.

UID Only Capability

IMAP servers that support UID only mode should announce using UIDONLY on the CAPABILITY response as specified in the <u>UIDONLY RFC</u>.

Enabling UID Only Mode

IMAP servers and clients need to support the ENABLE and CONDSTORE RFCs to start using the "All Mail" mailbox. Client should check if the server supports ENABLE, CONDSTORE & UIDONLY capabilities and only then the client enables the UID only extension.

The following interaction shows a client listing the server capabilities followed by enabling the UID only mode.

LIST Response

The IMAP server will include a mailbox with an "\All" tag after client requests exposing the virtual "All Mail" mailbox. IMAP clients will be able to perform LIST and STATUS calls similar to other IMAP mailboxes. Every STATUS & LIST-STATUS will include MAILBOXID in the response, refer to <u>OBJECTID RFC</u>.

In the example below, the client requests a listing of all mailboxes after "UIDONLY" was enabled.

UID as MSN

After the UID only mode is enabled using the <u>UIDONLY RFC</u> extension, the client and server interact using only UIDs. We are making the following changes to the IMAP server operation to completely remove MSNs in the protocol:

- The IMAP server will reject all IMAP MSN commands.
- The IMAP server will respond with UID in place of MSN for all responses.
- The IMAP server will return a MESSAGELIMIT failure to clients requesting messages exceeding the PARTIAL value.
- The IMAP server will return a VANISHED response for deleted messages.

Rejecting MSN Commands

After UID only mode is enabled, the IMAP server will switch all MSN responses to be UID on all the mailboxes. IMAP clients must not use message sequence number requests on any mailbox for reading or updating messages.

The transaction below shows the response from the server for a client attempting to use sequence numbers in the "All Mail" mailbox.

LIMIT Response on FETCH & SEARCH

After the UID only mode is enabled, the IMAP server will respond with a LIMIT failure on FETCH & SEARCH for requests exceeding the PARTIAL. Below are some of the requests that will fail and the server response.

MOVE Command to update Mailbox

The "All Mail" mailbox is virtual and the messages listed belong to the mailboxes returned by the LIST command. The MOVE command can be used to update the mailbox of a message.

Limited View Mailbox

By default, Yahoo/Aol IMAP servers will limit the maximum number of messages accessible on the mailbox. Users can configure the maximum number of messages through their mail settings on the web. Limited view will support IMAP protocol compliant message sequence numbers. Although clients can use both MSN and UID based commands in this mode, they are encouraged to use UIDs as much as possible. For large mailboxes, an IMAP client in the limited view will only have access to the top of the mailbox or the largest UIDs in the mailbox. The following examples will demonstrate the server responses to various client requests.
